Recipe of the week, sent in from Aberfeldy!

EASTER BREAD AND BUTTER PUDDING

4 hot cross buns Butter 2 eggs 500ml milk 3 tbsp. Cointreau 40g sugar

Slice buns and spread generously with butter.

Cut into thick slices and layer in oven-proof dish.

Sprinkle over ½ sugar.

Beat eggs, milk, remaining sugar and Cointreau and pour over buns. Leave to stand.

Bake at 180° (fan 160°) for 45-60 minutes.
